Old Testament tabernacle replica coming to CHM this August



Messiah's Mansion, a full-scale replica of the ancient tabernacle built by the Hebrew nation, will be on display and available for free tours at Christian Healthcare Ministries Aug. 3-11, 2013.

Messiah's Mansion enables you to travel back in time over 3,000 years to the desert between Egypt and Israel when the Hebrews built a tabernacle for their God.

The modern Messiah's Mansion tabernacle is built to scale and is intended to look like the original tabernacle did to the

ancient Hebrews.

Each element in the tabernacle had deep, significant meaning to the Hebrew people—and each is explained in the tour.

“We are thrilled to be the host site of Messiah's Mansion in August,” said CHM President Rev. Howard

Russell. “The exhibit is a rich representation of biblical history and a great opportunity to reach our community with the Gospel of Jesus Christ and the good news of Christian Healthcare Ministries.”

How much freedom is there in surrender?

Freedom. What does it mean? More importantly, on a personal level, what does it mean to us as Christians?

In the New Testament, Pontius Pilate asks Jesus a three-word question that is one of the Bible's most quoted lines: "What is truth?"

An equally poignant question is this: What is freedom?

As we celebrate July 4, the birthday of U.S. independence, we might think of freedom as the ability to speak positively or negatively about our government without being carted off by the secret police. Others might cite any number of other rights guaranteed in the Constitution.

It's important to note that the Bill of Rights, the first 10 amendments to the Constitution, don't describe the responsibilities of citizens to the government; they are specific in terms of protecting citizens from the power of government.

When settlers first arrived in the Americas from Europe, a driving force was the desire for religious freedom.

A 2001 paper by four University of North Carolina at Pembroke students said this about the first American settlers: "Many people came to America to search for religious freedom. Their hope was to escape the religious persecution they were facing in their countries. The one thing they did not want to do was to establish a church like the

Church of England. The colonists wanted a chance to worship freely and have an opportunity to choose which religion they wanted to take part in.

"Upon arriving in America (the Pilgrims being the first to arrive in 1620), the journey began for the search of the 'perfect' religion that could satisfy the needs of the people... Many religious groups (such as the Quakers and Puritans) formed the first 13 colonies on the basis of their religious beliefs."

Thus, the United States was born as a nation of faith.

But the "perfect" religion was difficult for imperfect people to find. They quarreled. They argued. They competed. But the crucial point is that they were free to do all of those things.

Religious freedom and personal freedom go hand-in-hand—but are not the same. The Bible has a different viewpoint on freedom. It's focused on the inner person.

Some examples:

- **John 8: 31-32:** "To the Jews who had believed him, Jesus said, 'If you hold to my teaching, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.'"
- **2 Corinthians 3:17:** "Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom."
- **Galatians 5:1:** "It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened

again by a yoke of slavery."

- **1 Peter 2:16:** "Live as free people, but do not use your freedom as a cover-up for evil; live as God's slaves."

Surrendering to Christ is freedom, but surrender is more easily said than done. For most of us, the idea of surrender is foreign to our nature. We're free people. Surrendering means giving up our free will.

As Christians, we are not slaves of God in the sense that we are in bondage and laboring for Him against our will. Since God is the author of our individual will, service to Him is actually our greatest freedom. We are set free through His grace for eternity. Based on His word, we are free without question through the sacrifice of His son.

As we celebrate our nation's freedom, let's also remember the even greater freedom, the irrevocable freedom, the spiritual freedom, the personal freedom—and the eternal freedom—that belongs to all of us who believe in Him.

Thank God for freedom. And thanks for our freedom—personally and spiritually—goes to God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Summer is upon us and there's no easier time of the year to eat colorfully. T

he highly-publicized "5-a-Day" campaign is a great help. Originally, the FDA recommended five servings of fruits or veggies per day, but now it has changed that number to nine. Study after study confirms that vitamins, minerals and phytochemicals in produce decrease your risk of cancer, stroke, heart disease and

diabetes. If that isn't enough, these foods also improve your vision and memory and strengthen bones.

Below are a few suggestions to add color to your food rainbow:

Red: peppers, apples, cherries, tomatoes, cranberries, strawberries, raspberries, watermelon

Yellow/orange: peppers, carrots, zucchini, mangoes, oranges, apricots, peaches, pumpkin, corn, sweet potatoes

White: jicama, bananas, pears, cauliflower, turnips

Green: zucchini, spinach, peppers, honeydew melons, broccoli, Brussels

The super-awesome podiatric toxin remover

The world of medicine, especially what is considered alternative medicine, is replete with questionable practitioners who are ready and willing to hock their wares, make unsubstantiated claims, prey on unsuspecting customers and pocket the profits.

Sometimes things just aren't as they seem. Consider the following example from my life.

One day my dad was excited to show me the new detox machine he had purchased from a Texas distributor. I was ushered into the living room where a family member, who had agreed to be his guinea pig, awaited us. The "patient" was instructed to remove his shoes and socks and roll up his pant legs. Dad filled a basin half-full of water, measured out some powder and mixed it into the water. He asked the patient to place his feet into the basin of solution, then produced an electrical gizmo that looked like a battery tester on steroids.

As my dad placed its electrodes into the water, I wondered if it would electrocute his patient. Dad adjusted some dials, plugged in the machine and turned it on.

For the next several minutes a rusty, brown color tainted the water, foaming over the surface. The longer we waited, the darker it became. Dad pointed to the murky solution. "Look at all those toxins coming out of his body! Do you want to try it,

Mike?"

I looked at the solution, then at the patient. He seemed to be fine, despite the large amount of poison coming from his body. "Sure," I said, "but let me run a baseline test first."

I asked dad to set everything up again. He did so and instructed me to insert my bare feet into the clean solution.

"Wait a minute," I said. "Run the machine as you would normally, but without my feet in it." He looked at me quizzically but followed my instruction. After several minutes, the same rusty, brown liquid and foam appeared.

Dad stared at the pan in disbelief. "Well I'll be!" he cried. "How about that?"

"Those aren't toxins coming out of anyone's body, Dad," I replied. "That murky brown stuff must be a product of whatever salt compound you're using and its interaction with the water and electrodes."

Still scratching his head, Dad said, "I'm going to have to call that man in Texas who sold this to me. He's got some explaining to do."

My father is a very smart man who holds several graduate degrees. However, he bought into a scheme without objectively testing its claims. He fell for the ruse hook, line and sinker.







lasts approximately 75 minutes and is divided into five sections: basic structural overview; courtyard, altar of sacrifice and laver; the Holy Place, table of showbread, altar of incense and candlesticks; the Most Holy Place and the Ark of the Covenant; and the high priest’s symbolic garments.

Operated by the staff and students of Oklahoma Academy in Harrah, Okla., Messiah’s Mansion has drawn crowds since 2003; one venue attracted more than 10,000 visitors. Like the Old Testament tabernacle carried from camp to camp by the Hebrews, the replica spends a lot of time traveling. It has been featured in 50 exhibits across the United States, Canada and Jamaica.

Setting up the Mansion at CHM will require 300 local volunteers and 700 labor hours after it arrives on the academy’s semi-truck.

“We’d love for our local CHM members—or those who may be traveling to northeast Ohio—to come for a tour of Messiah’s Mansion or even to volunteer to help,” said Russell. “This is an outreach event, so those who come for a tour should bring family members, friends and church groups with them.”

CHM members is \$280, saving them more than \$700 per month.

Dollar savings weren't the only advantage for Shaun and Misti, however; they appreciated the simplicity of the sharing process. Once the couple learned they were expecting again, Misti called CHM Needs Processing representative Yvonne Woolridge, who directed her to the necessary paperwork and helped Misti complete the documents needed by her midwife's clinic for monthly appointments and delivery. "All my questions were answered," said Misti. "I felt a huge relief, knowing I was being taken care of."

"It's important to ask for a self-pay discount from each health care provider," added Misti. "This brings the cost of services down and helps with the sharing process for other members. Knowing that CHM members were ready to help with our costs empowered me to ask my health

care providers for discounts."

The cost of Misti's second pregnancy was approximately \$10,000. Her medical bills included monthly doctor visits, lab work, ultrasounds, delivery and a post-natal visit. "All my expenses were taken care of once I met my Gold level personal responsibility of \$500," she said.

With CHM's help, the Bloedows were able to focus on the most important thing: the birth of their daughter, Ashley Elisabeth, on November 2, 2012.

"The Lord has blessed us and we definitely recommend CHM's maternity program to all couples planning to grow their family. We are so pleased with CHM. The staff members are kind, caring and helpful."

The Bloedows are often asked how they pay for health care. With a smile, they tell about the impact CHM has had on

their lives. "I know that if it wasn't for CHM, we would have been forced to pay outrageous prices for insurance," Misti said.

sprouts, apples, asparagus, arugula, peas, avocado, kiwi

Purple/blue: plums, cabbage, grapes, blueberries, blackberries, huckleberries



The challenge: integrating more fruits and veggies into your day.

The solution:

1. Breakfast, the most important meal, is an easy time to start off well. If you skip breakfast, start working it back into your schedule with a piece of fruit. Grab a banana with your java.

2. If you already start your day with some fuel, adding fruit is easy. Put berries on your oatmeal. Dice an apple and eat with your cereal. Whole grain toast with peanut, almond or sunflower butter, a dab of honey and a sliced banana tastes like dessert. Sweeten your pancakes with blueberries.

3. If you're packing your midday meal, be sure to put a piece of fruit in your box, along with a baggie full of sweet peas, baby carrots or chopped jicama. That easily gives you another color point or two.

4. Packing a sandwich in your box? Think nutrient-rich. Use spinach instead of iceberg lettuce. Bring sliced tomatoes. Top

your sandwich with sprouts and you'll be good to go.

5. Who says dessert can't be healthy? Mix lowfat vanilla yogurt and fresh berries. Fresh, sliced pineapple, dried apricots or dates are a tasty and nutritious finish.

6. If you must go to a restaurant for lunch, you can still include color. What about a veggie burrito or a vegetable dish at a Chinese restaurant? Subway offers peppers, tomatoes, onions and cucumbers for your sandwich. Ordering wisely may put you ahead of the nine-point target!

7. Dinner is the easiest time to "veg out." For salads, think outside of the traditional iceberg lettuce box. See how many colors you can combine. If you have kids, make it a game. Don't be shy about including fruit;



chopped oranges, raisins, cranberries and strawberries are great salad companions.

8. When was the last time you made coleslaw? Use purple cabbage, raisins and apples. Try making good old-fashioned apple salad. Combine red and green apples with currants or cranberries. Replace mayo with a bit of milk. Add to Greek yogurt and sweeten the salad with a small amount of sugar.

If you want more substance, pasta salad is

a great dinner option. Add kidney beans to whole wheat noodles. Sprinkle with color, including finely diced onion and peppers. Make enough for tomorrow's lunchbox.

9. Begin to think in terms of adding veggies to everything. Load your pasta sauce with zucchini, onions and green and red peppers. If Mexican is your favorite fare, bulk up that burrito with multicolored peppers. Sizzling stir fry has endless options, and if you're serving good old meat and potatoes, slip in a steamed

green for that extra point.

The film's storyline was fueled by Stacie's love of hymns and Church history. "I also wanted a story that would help children from Christian homes grow in their relationship with God," she said.

The Grabers brought together a crew of 30 filmmakers, filming for five weeks in summer 2011 in Bryan, Texas, and its surrounding areas. As part of the project, the Grabers wanted to train young filmmakers. They brought on several experts to help lead the (mostly) volunteer crew. The cast consisted primarily of volunteers as well. The film includes 40 speaking roles and more than 150 extras. After filming was completed, the Grabers
